

# Raiders short on size

Without a lot of height on the North Farmington boys basketball team, the Raiders will depend heavily on a trio of veteran guards.

Six-foot senior Dean Pennala will run the team at point guard again, and seniors Mark Temple (6-1) and Jon Sturtz (5-11) will play on the wings where they are returning starters, also.

Sturtz just began practicing last week, however, after recovering from a hip pointer he received in the last football game.

North has only two players taller than 6-1 — seniors and varsity returnees Brad Pawlowksi (6-5) and Eric Hewett (6-3). One of those players usually is playing in the post.

"We're not going to be very big, so we have to rely on our guards with their experience and to make good decisions for us to be successful," North coach Tom Negoshian said.

"AT TIMES WE could end up not having a kid taller than 6-1 on the floor. That's why guard play and shot selection are going to be so important."

The Raiders, who were 8-13 last year, also return senior forwards Brian Lee (5-11) and Damon Hall (6-1).

"Four players join the varsity after playing on the JV team — juniors Todd Anderson (5-11), Scott Hoffman (6-1), Matt Quilling (6-2) and Paul Simpson (5-1). Anderson and Quilling are forwards, Hoffman a wing and Simpson a guard. Rounding out the roster are senior Colby Sanders (6-5) and junior Chris Ward (6-0), both transfer students who play guard."

"As you can see, we'll have a 6-foot forward on the floor most times," Negoshian said. "But sometimes a disadvantage ends up being an advantage, because a big guy has to guard a little guy."

The Raiders hope to overcome that disadvantage with good passing and team balance.

"We need to spread the ball around and take good shots," Negoshian said. "We're not consistently going to have one good scorer all the time. It's going to be one kid one night and one another night."

(Pennala, Temple and Sturtz) being returning guards will dictate that by spreading the ball around."

"THE THREE-POINT shot is an offensive weapon the Raiders hope to use effectively as they attempt to counter any height disadvantage. The three senior guards and Hoffman are capable of hitting the three at any time, Negoshian said.

"If you're small, the one thing that neutralizes a game is the three-point shot. It's probably the most important line they've put in — if not for the total game, certainly for the little man."

"I think it's been great for the game, and it's put an emphasis on shooting, not just pounding and pounding inside."

North will face some opposition when they return to Farmington Hills, Harrison, Plymouth Canton, Livonia Stevenson and Plymouth Sa-

lem in the Western Lakes Activities Association, and the Raiders will have to find a way to deal with that.

"Our league is not known as a small league," Negoshian said. "There's a lot of physical play, and it is a concern how we are going to hold up. That will be one of our major question marks going into the season."

The Raiders lost their top rebounder (Bill Chwalki) through graduation, as well as Todd Pawlowksi and Chris White. Chwalki is starting for the Macomb Community College basketball team, Pawlowksi plays football at Northwestern University and White is on the Henry Ford CC basketball team.

"IT'S THE SAME thing with scoring," Negoshian said. "Rebounding becomes a team effort. We don't have a Bill Chwalki who gets his 12 a game. We need each kid to grab his three or four and hope some night a kid is going to get into double figures."

Negoshian recalls a previous concern with rebounding that proved to be unfounded.

"In 1987-88 we had one of the smallest teams I've ever coached," he said. "We thought it was a liability that year, too, and we ended up winning the (WHLA) championship."

"Everybody has something in a liability; it turns out to be the other way around. What is probably more important is the chemistry of the team and how the kids play together."

Negoshian said a top priority is to make the WHLA playoffs, something he said "hasn't happened in 10 years." North begins the season Tuesday at home against Berkley.

7. Lamar Westbrook, senior guard, Redford Bishop Burgess: Westbrook is no

8. Bill Malochi, 6-1 senior guard, Redford Union: Can score with the best of them. Just does he get any? Shows little emotion and at times looks bored on the court.

# Late start won't slow Hawks

Farmington Hills Harrison had its first basketball practice with a full complement of players Monday, but coach Mike Teachman is accustomed to dealing with a late start.

The Hawks would do so well in football and play so late into November that basketball is forced to wait for those who participate in both sports.

"This year was no exception as eight of the 14 basketball players helped Harrison win the Class 3B football title Nov. 30, including senior boys regulars Andy Fitzpatrick, Dan Hight, Mike Pesci and Duante Anderson."

"The fact we're a senior-dominated team will help," Teachman said. "There's not quite as many new things and adjustments that need to be made."

Plus, the schedule is right for the Hawks, who play only three non-league games before the holiday break.

THEN TEACHMAN plans to give the team a week to 10 days off, one reason being the football players are "the most banged up they have ever been" at the end of that season.

Senior Greg Fitzpatrick (knee injury) and Hight (broken collarbone) are not fully recovered, according to Teachman. Pesci, who was a starter center, played all last month with a stress fracture in his leg and will miss the first month of basketball.

Teachman has been working with his best players since practice began, however. Senior Paul Gilvydis (6-4, 210) will be a three-year starter and has drawn the attention of many college scouts.

"He'll be the most recruited basketball player we've ever had at Harrison," Teachman said. "There might not be enough room for fans in the

gym at the first game, because so many college scouts will be in the stands."

"He's a 4.0 student and he won't go to a place that Dick Vitale talks about, but a place that will be solid for him basketball wise and will give him a good education."

Western Michigan, West Point, Harvard, North Carolina-Greensboro, Bucknell, Butler are Division II school within 500 miles are interested in Gilvydis, who plays power forward and averaged 12 points and 10 rebounds.

"IT MIGHT NOT be because of numbers, either (that he most helps the team)," Teachman said. "He might not average 20-25 points, but others can pick off his ability."

"If people don't guard him, he can shoot the three. And he has a great supporting cast. If teams double team him, they're leaving good players open."

Harrison, which finished 15-7 and won the West-Grand Division title for the fourth time in six years, will need several players to pick up the scoring slack for former all-area star Andrew Smith, according to Teachman. Smith scored 20th points and grabbed six rebounds per game.

Helping Gilvydis to do that will be Fitzpatrick (6-4) at center in place of Pesci. Anderson at small forward, Hight (5-9) at point guard and Junior Jeremy Teachman (6-1) at shooting guard. When Pesci returns, Fitzpatrick will move to forward.

Fitzpatrick averaged eight points and six rebounds, Pesci six in each category. Teachman, who moved up to the varsity at mid-season, averaged seven points, including 10 in the last six games.

Teachman made big strides in the summer, playing against PSL and Catholic League players in the Ricky Byrdsong camp, according to his father and coach.

"WE TOOK HIM there for the experience, and he upped his level of play tremendously," Teachman said.

Hight makes the offense go, averaging eight assists while scoring four points. He had 159 assists, second only to the school-record 173 Dan Hickey had in 1972.

Anderson will make a bigger contribution this year, too, Teachman said.

"He's just a great, great athlete, and we've probably only seen the tip of the iceberg. You'll probably see him improve as much as he did in football."

The starting five is being pushed in practice by the second team, and there isn't much difference between the two units, Teachman said.

Junior Keye Smith (5-10) and senior Ben Pinsky (5-8) are the center, senior Justin Romans (6-4) the center and Fitzpatrick (6-2) the power forward. Juniors Ryan Cahill (6-0) and Jeff Celis (5-11) are even at small forward.

Romans played on the JV but is "probably the best jumper on the team" and a talent unknown to most opponents. Other varsity players are Juniors Rich Ruffin (6-3) and Antair Salim (5-7).

BESIDES STAYING healthy, the success of Harrison's season depends on players accepting their roles, according to Teachman.

"When you get this many good athletes together, sometimes guys don't want to play roles. If you put eight or nine of these guys on another team, they would be the go-to guy. They have to realize they can't do everything themselves. If they pull together, good things can happen for this group."

The Hawks, who move up to Class A next month, entertain West Bloomfield in the opener Tuesday.

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
