

Harrison begins with hoop upset

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Marks scored five points early as West Bloomfield pulled to within six, 33-33, with 3:25 remaining in the third.

JEREMY TEACHMAN (13 points) tossed in back-to-back buckets in the closing minute of the third, and Justin Romans finished a 10-0 Harrison run with an inside basket at the buzzer as the third quarter ended with Harrison holding a comfortable 49-33 lead.

"Piscopink, Romans and Smith gave us a big lift off the bench," Teachman said. "We got a nice effort all the way down to nine guys. Our defense was amazing for this early in the year. You can't play man-on-man full court defense the whole game without a lot of people helping out, and we got it."

Matt Domke sparked a late rally by the Lakers, scoring 12 of 14 points in the fourth quarter. But every time West Bloomfield made a run, Piscopink, Teachman, Fitzpatrick or Glividyis answered with a basket to keep the Lakers in check.

IRONICALLY, coach Domke said his team had to do the same thing Harrison did to get on the winning track.

"We have to go back and simplify things," Domke said. "We have to go with the KISS theory."

Although the loss was a disappointment for the Lakers, Domke remained philosophical. "The sun is going to come up tomorrow," he said. "We've always had a saying that it's not how you start the season but how you finish it."

The Lakers host Royal Oak Dondoro Friday.

Redford Catholic Central missed some critical free throws down the stretch, but a big halftime lead allowed the Shamrocks to win Tuesday's boys basketball season-opener 58-54 over visiting Ypsilanti.

CC enjoyed a 34-23 halftime lead and led 52-37 after three quarters before nearly self destructing in the fourth quarter. The Shamrocks were outscored 17-6 in the final eight minutes and missed five front ends of one-and-one free throws in the final two minutes, coach Bernie Holowicki said.

"We played hard, but wilted a little at the end," Holowicki said. "If we would have lost, after leading by so much, it would have been like having a noose around your neck. But winning is a good feeling because we played a quality club."

Bob Kummer, a 6-foot-6 senior guard, paced the CC attack with 13 points and 15 rebounds. Senior center Chad Varga chipped in 12 points and pulled down 18 rebounds. Junior forward Brian Faluk added 10 points.

Ypsilanti is led by 6-foot-8 Mr. Basketball candidate Shannon Williams but on this night, Braves guard Marlos Long caused the Shamrocks more havoc. Long scored a game-high 25 points, while Williams had the highlight of the night—a dunk off an alley-oop pass.

"They played tough defense all night long," Kummer said. "I think we got a little tired at the end and that's why they came back. We had the same players on the floor for a long time."

Holowicki praised the play of sophomore forward Chris Chichila and reserve forward Will Marcoux, who "gave us 10 to 12 minutes of excellent ball."
