2 Choirs Plan Concert May 14

The Schoolcraft College Symphonic Choir (community singers) and the Schoolcraft Choral (college students) will present their annual Spring Concert on Friday, May 14.

Under the direction of Bradley Bloom, the concert will be given at 8 p.m. in the auxiliary gymnasium of the Physical Education Building. Admission is free.

THE MAJOR WORK by the choir will be Schubert's "Mass in G." With chorus, soloists and string orchestra. Solos will be sung by soprano Judy Slade, a member of the Symphonic Choir, tenor Stephen Skelley, an announcer with Station WUOM, and bass Keith Whitmer, a Schoolcraft counselor.

Three Negro spirituals and selections from "Man of

LaMancha" will conclude the choral's performance. Haydn's "The Creation" will be presented by the Symphonic Choir. It is based on the book of Genesis and Milton's "Paradise Lost."

DIRECTOR BLOOM describes the work as "a charming musical depiction of nature and of man's innocent joy in the simple natural life."

Soprano soloists - for "Creation" are three members of the choir, Rosemary Didonizio, Connie Heidt and Jo Kiltman. Tenor solos will be sung by Don Bohwagner, a member of the choir, and Skelley. Bass soloists, both from the choir, are Russell Beck and James Graham. The orchestra for the concert consists of Schoolcraft's Wind Ensemble and guest musicians.
