tradition and distrust of state bur-reaucracy.

"New Jersey has 700 school dis-tricts. Michigan has 550. I respect it (local control). You can't remove local control by the state, but the state should work as a partner," said Schiller.

\$46 million for Rouge cleanup

Wayne and Oakland county offi-cials say a \$45 million pilot project will go a long way toward cleaning the Rouge Hillor.

Announced last week, the \$46 mil-lion pilot project will create reten-tion basins for combined sewer over-flows — the last major source of Rouge poliution.

"We hope to have one-third of all overflows under control by 1996," Wayne County public works director James Murray said.

Overflows, containing human waste and other pollutants, are considered the last major source of Rouge pollution. They are the product of combined sewers old, outmoded municipal lines that back up in heavy rain and flooding and dump waste as well as storm water into the river.

While Rouge River Industrial pollution has substantially been brought under control, the pilot project is the first major attempt to curtail overflows.

The federal program will provide

for design and partial construction of overflow retention basins in Redford, Detroit, Dearborn and Dearborn Heights, Murray said But each community must also pay 45 percent of construction costs.

Oakland County basins will be built in Birmingham and Beverly Hills, county drain commissioner Coerge Kulm said. Overall Rouge cleanup has been estimated at \$250 million or more, with the majority of money coming from individual communities.
