Peltz-MDOT panel to hammer out final plan

It's time to roll up the sleeves and sit down to some tough thinking and hard work.

That's the next task for some members of the Farmington Hills Pelta-MBOT committee who plan to meet within the week and hammer out the best plan to replace wellands from the 12 Mile boulevard project to the Pelta-MBOT land, south of I-696, west of Farmington Road.

CITY OFFICIALS expect to obtain that permit by Jan. 31. The permit would be based on the city's application that went to the DNR with a copy of a plan to replace the wetlands on the MDOT portion of the Feltz-MDOT land, said Farmington lills assistant city manager David Call.

Without the replacement of wetlands along 12 Mile, the city could lose a \$3.6 million state grant the will help pay for the next estimated \$1 million boulevard mile, Halsted to Haggerty, Call said.

The original plan is not what the Feltz-MDOT committee wants. The committee's environmental planning consultant Todd Holloway has developed four alternative plans to the original one by landscape architect. John Grissim of Farmington Hills.

The goal for many committee members is to try to reduce the amount of wellands that need replacing and to reduce the amount of land at Peltz-MDOT used for replacement, as well as to reduce any damage to the vegetation and wild-life.

Grissim's original plan called for using almost 22 acres of the MDOT land to replace 7.3 acres of wetlands. That was based on the need to replace 4.5 acres from 12 Mile. The DNR. Call sald, requires replacement at 14-times what will be filled in.

THE 22-ACRE plan included about 7.3 acres of actual wetlands and another 16 acres for the area around the wetlands that would be stated to the acres of the acres of the acres of the acres of the plan however, inturiates one committee members who considered it tantamount to mass destruction of the land. At the latest Peltz-MDOT meeting more than a week 2go, Call and city manager William Costick sald they do not want to destroy the acresge. Holloway also told the committee that Grissim's plan could be reduced to using only 11.2 acres by having

The worst case scenario calls for replacing 7.26 acres. That includes 0.60-acres of a Howard Boad with a house the city would like to build a nuise berm for residents near 1698. It also includes 0.46-acres at the intersection of 2 hille and Hagerty where the Hagerty Road Connector is expected to be constructed. This wetland is included in case the connector is not built. If the connector is built, "we expect they (the state) will take care of it," Call sald.

THE WORST case scenario also includes 0.92-acres in the area 800-feet east of Haggerty to 400 feet east of Halsted. It also includes 2.52 acres in the mile stretch of Halsted to Drake and another 0.33-acres of ungregulated wetlands in the Hag-

less sloping and berms.

Call — with the belp of consultants Applied Science & Technology, Inc., of Ann Arbor — clarified just whan needs to be replaced from the 12 Mile project.

Call said it is possible to replace wetlands from the one-mile stretch of boulevard construction expected this year from Haggerty to Halsted and to worry about wetlands re-placement later for the Halsted to Drake mile later.

The four alternatives developed by Holloway call for 3-4 acres of wetlands replacement, not including the acreage that might be disturbed for the wetlands. The alternatives call for a smaller wetlands replacement and less disturbance to the surrounding area.

The Peltz-MDOT committee's next meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p.m., Feb. 12 when it's expected a wetlands replacement recommendation will be made and later presented to the city council

Hart, 68, was named police chief by Detroit Mayor Coleman Young in 1976. He was suspended with pay after a federal grand jury indicated him in February, 1990, on charges of embertlement, conspiracy, tax evasion and obstruction of justice. If convicted, Hart faces up to 10 years in prison on any of the seven counts in the indictment.

U.S. District Court prosecutors maintain that Hart embezzied \$1.3 million from checks he wrote to cash and steered another \$1.3 million from checks in wrote to cash and steered another \$1.3 million from checks in Deputy Chief Kenneth Weiner.

Weiner, a former business partner of Coleman Young's, pleaded guilty in the fall of 1991 to embezzlement and other charges. He is serving a 10-year sentence and is not expected to testify in the Hart trial.
