A public hearing is scheduled to discuss determination of special assessment district for a portion of Westmoreland Drive in the Spring Brook subdivision, watermain installation.

A series of ordinances regarding building issues and regulations is expected to be enacted.

The council also will consider ap-

pointments and re-appointments to boards and commissions. An ordinance amending city code to provide for the recovery of costs for emergency responses is expected to be introduced. Also to be introduced is an ordinance to regulate organizations and soliciting, as well as ordinances permitting the fire department to recover costs associated with emergency incidents and the control and regulation of the storage and use of hazardous materials.

The council also will receive a report on water meter installation for lawn sprinkling and a report on water-sewer late billing from the Oakland County DPW.
