THE 56-year-old Bulgarian-born arists began creating his large scale, temporary works in 1961.
Last year he erected 3,100 blue and yellow umbrellas, which stood 19 feet tail and 28 feet in diameter, in Japan and California. Tragedy marred the \$26 million project when an umbrella toppled by the wind killed a-woman in California, and later when a worker was killed dismantling the project in Japan.
