At 6 p.m. the city council will meet in the lower level conference room for a study session. The agenda includes:

- Consideration of a request from the Committee to Increase Voter Participation to include Mercy High School in the student mock election program.

April 6 hearing to settle fate of closed health spa

ker, 36; Yong Mi Ingram, 32; Kim Ok Stokes, 41; and Ok Chua McElvany, 47, pleaded not guilty to city misdemeanor charges punishable by a maximum 90 days in jail and \$100 fine.

BRUNET, PARK, Ingram and Stokes were charged with four counts each of accounting and soliciting, engaging in an illegal occupation or business, loitering in a place of illegal occupation or business, and aiding and abetting.

Stokes, the spa's licensee, also was charged with operating an illegal place of occupation or business. McElvany, believed to be a janitor for the spa, was charged with loitering at the spa. The five women are free on bond. While Stokes is the spa's licensee, the other women are licensed through the city to provide massages.

Attorney Eugene Oak of Southfield, who represented the women at their arraignments in 47th District Court the day of the raid, could not be reached for comment.

If the women change their pleas to

guilty at the pretrial hearing today, "the license would be lost automatically. Based on the ordinance, you cannot be convicted of a misdemeanor (and be licensed for a massage parlor)," Dwyer said.

The city council, however, is not bound by what happens in 47th District Court. "It is not necessary for purposes of conducting the hearing to have a conviction. The council can make a determination independent of any criminal conviction," Dwyer said.

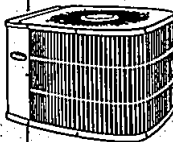
The morning raid on the health spa capped a two-week investigation that included undercover police officers who went to the spa posing as customers.

The investigation began as part of the department and city's inspections of establishments licensed under the city's massage parlor ordinance.

The raid resulted in the removal of \$30,000 worth of furnishings. Little cash was removed.

The April 6 hearing will be the second such hearing before the city council. In 1985, police raided and padlocked five health spas believed to be part of an organized prostitution ring. After the raid, the city council had a special hearing when an operator of one of the five raided parlors applied for a license under the massage parlor ordinance. The operator was denied the license.
