At-Large Election Ordered For S'craft

Circuit Judge Roland Olzark late Friday ordered at-large election of trustees of School-craft College on Sept. 13, emphasizing it was only a temporary measure until the Michigan Legislature can write "one-man, one-vote" reapportionment.

Olzark, however, rejected the Schoolcraft board's proposal for a nine-man board and instead ordered an eight-man board, the same

as at present.

Although they had promised to do so, no one from the new Democratic Coalition of Livonia appeared to argue in favor of a "ward" or single-member district plan.

State Rep. Marvin Stempien (D-Livonia), who has drafted a bill requiring single-member districts, failed in a plae to have the judge order the college board to draw up such a plan.

Trustees John LaRue, George Martin and Robert Geake, who are already elected atlarge, will be allowed to remain in office. Voters on Sept. 13 will elect five trustees.


