Broomfield served three terms in the Michigan House, to which he was first cleeted at age 26. Honigman was first elected at age 26. Broomfield is reported to have a campaign war chest of more than \$900,000 accumulated from his years of fund-raising. This is his last apportunity to retire and convert his campaign funds to personal use. Honigman spent 1592,000 just to win his current state. Senate campaigns in Michigan history. Broomfield is a gray-flannel sult-style, dedicated Congressman who has spent most of his time and ener-gy dealing with foreign affairs, ris-ing to become the ranking Republi-can on the flouse Foreign Affairs Committee. He has generally gone

along with Reagan-Bush policies and has not authored major legislation. He maintains a Birmingham off-ice, but doesn't spend much time in the area, communicating with his constituency mainly via the mail. A liscal conservative, he was quickly able to clear himself from any axos-ciation with the flouse banking scen-dal.

Honigman, known for not wearing socks, has a reputation for staying in direct touch with his constituents. He olirect touch with his constituents. He is reputed to have gotten more legislation through the Senate In his first Is months than many have in their carcers. He has filp flopped on abortion — he once was pro-cholec, then pro-life, now votes pro-life but says he doesn't want abortion criminalized.

Broomfield has been consistently pro-life — but once voted to override the President's veto of a bill to ease restrictions on Medicald abortions in cases of rape or Incest.

HOW THEY DIFFER on other major issues is hard to gauge since they've had such different fields of play So it's critical that voters in the newly-drawn 11th Congressional District learn their general philoso-

District learn their general philosophies and issue-by-issue stands. This can best be done through debate — which can be carried live and then retelected on each of the committed, whose recent extended to debate his challengers in the past. which has a liberal constitution, a copen housing law, a fair employment law and vocal minority groups to seek their enforcement.


