Friends remember ex-boxer Adamick

James J. Adamick gave up driving four years ago because of problems with his sight but that didn't stop him from getting around his Livonia neighborhood. On foot, and in any kind of weath-

er.
Adamick's favorite trips in his south-side Livonia neighborhood were to Shelden Center to shop and to St. Michael's, where he attended

to St. Michael's, where he attended mass every day.

"He'd trudge through tons of snow," recalled Adamick's son, Myles J., 31. "He'd walk up there, rain or shine. The cold never bothered him: I have pictures of him during our latest snowstorm shoveling, with a T-shirt on."

Adamick, '77, died of a heart attack Sunday at St. Mary's Hospital in Livonia.

ADAMICK, BORN in Midland, was a world professional heavy-weight boxing contender in the 1930s, But to this neighbors in Livonia the last 35 years he was known more for his riendly demeasured. "He had a heart of gold," Myles sald, "Inever knew he knew all these people until tonight (Tuesday) when me, but I used to see your dat overy day going to church. Everywhere he'd walk he'd meet people. He just loved to make his rounds."

A Golden Gloves amateur boxing champion in 1933, Adamick turned professional later, that year and shared the same manager as Jack Dempsey, Adamick had 54 wins, including \$2 by kneckout, and only two losses as a professional.

He was ranked as high as third in the world in the heavyweight class.

shot at fighting Detroiter Joe Louis
for the heavyweight crown.

Boxing was by far Adamick's favoit the obby, recalled Myles, and he
had a special love for the heavyweight division.

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
