

Center knocks out old to bring in new stores

Knock down the old, put up the new . . . that seems to be the development: philosophy of the people who run the Lochman's Hunters. Square shopping center in northern Farmington Hills.

The wrecker's ball and other heavy construction equipment this week are leveling the structure that once housed Taily Hall, the "featival food" court that used to attract upscale shoppers.

In its place will rise a new shopping center with several new stores, said Andy Shaw, project manager for Sherr Development, the Farmington Hills-based companying to the facility. ny that owns the facility,

About 35,000 square feet will be demolished, Shaw added, and the new mall cover 136,000 square feet. A grand opening is planned for Nov. 16 in time for the holiday shopping season.

"I would say this will be more of a strip shopping center," Shaw said, "not an enclosed mail."

WHEN COMPLETED, Shaw said, the new mall will, include as additions Bed, Bath & Beyond, a dry goods store; two clothing stores, Marshall's and Men's Warehouse; and Famous Footware. A Winkelman's ladies store will return.

Still functioning among the debris and expected to remain are Loehmann's, a ladies clothing store; F&M discount drug store; Marvin's Marvelous Mechanical

Museum, and three restaurants, Max & Erma's, Anita's Kitchen and the Honey Tree.

"Probably the hardest part is keeping the businesses open during the construction," said Greg Czarnik, project engineer for Turner Construction, which is demolishing the old mail. "We want them to be inconvenced as little as possible."
Shaw refused to say how much the renovation cost or how much Hunter Square paid for the Lochmann center last November.

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"We have to keep that confidential," he said. "You never know who might pick up on that."

the mall, said Dale Countegan, the city's director of Planning and Community Development.

"Ultimately, we think this'll pay dividends for the city' he said.

Tally Hall closed with little notice in December 1988, the owner claiming that the "festival food" concept had lost favor with upscale shoppers. The owners then attempted to attracts stores to replace the food shops.

The center was sold to its' present owners — Sherr Development — by Cardinal Savings of Cleveland, Ohio, last November.
