Recycling board nixes agreement



RRRASOC, a regional solid waste authority, doesn't recommend approving an agreement with Oakland County until the county gets a better grip on dealing with solid waste. Meanwhile nearly half of the county's garbage is exported elsewhere.

A regional solid waste authority is re-commending its members not support an intergovernmental agreement with Oakland County at this time.

The board of the Resource Recovery, and Recycling Authority of Southwest Oskiland County told its members at an April 30 meeting that it could not recommend approving such an agreement, until the county has a better handle on how to the read to the latter of the recovery of the recover how it plans to deal with solid waste lasues, including landfill space in the county and overall recycling.

The four year-old agency issued a po-

sition paper detailing its opinion.

Oakland County officials are trying to get agreement from all 61 municipalities in the county for their solid waste

ties in the county for their solid waste plan.

Robert Deadman, Farmington's city menager and chairman of RRRASOC, said the group would like to work with Onkland County, but said their plan has failed to political pressures because of problems they have encountered in building an incinentare and, getting sites for builty needed inntifill space in the county.

RRRASOC represents the cities of Farmington, Farmington Hills, South Eld, Novi, Walled Lake, Wixom, South Lyon and Lyon Township, Each community's elected governing board will vote on the intergovernmental agreement by the end of May. • Get an appropriate site for a landfill in Oakland County and negotiate to obtain agreements for exporting garbage to Wayne and Washtenaw counties as a cumulement.

RRRASOC officials say they cannot, RIRASOC officials say they cannot, in good faith, recommend an agreement for the county's program until it, is amended. "The overriding issue at this time, is strictly cost," Deadman said. "There really isn't a plan there anymore — we'd really be huying into an unknown."

The RRRASOC group was formed of-ter a coalition of six of its meinbers had discussed options for garbage cullec-tion/removal and recycling programs in their communities. The group furmed an authority, which now has two addi-tional members, and has moved ahead with curbside recycling programs and diternatives to handling the solid wate stream in member communities.




