Sharing tragedy

Author interviews 'survivors'

Adversity offers the ultimate tele

photo lens for viewing life.

Usually it's a crisis, such as a death, divorce or physical suffering, that inspires us to focus on its true theaning, according to Dennis Who-ley, author of "When the Worst That Can Happen Already Has: Conquering Life's Most Difficult Times."

Conquering Life's Most Difficult Times." Pain is a wanderful teacher," said Wholey, a farmer Southfield resident and host of PBS-TY's "La-teNight America." "We don't learn a heck of a hat about ourselves when things are going well. It teaches us how to love ourselves; how to receive love from other people; it teaches you to be compassionate to others. Pain in painful situations teaches us to love God."

Those are some of the views of 50 people interviewed in Wholey's book who've endured devastating life experiences. From those person-
