2 drown; Panic, no jackets cited

It may have been confusion, panic or possibly because they weren't wearing. He preservers. But the drowning of two Detroit Country Day students Thursday in Gilbert Lake apparently had nothing to do with alcohol, according to friends and police in Bloomfield Township.

Killed were sophomore Paul Bradley, 15, and junior Corey Jones, 16, who were attending an end-of-the-school-year party at the house of Frederick and Judy Green. Both

About 20 DCD students from various grades were attending the party, At about 7:15 p.m., four stu-dents, including Jones and Bradley, were in a canoe on the lake when met up with two girls in a pad-

"We met up about half way across the lake," said Meegan Boltwood, a sophomore at DCD.
Boltwood said they half-seriously decided to have a race back to the shore, knowing that a cance should castly outdistance a paddle boat.
But the boys couldn't get moving straight.

But the boys couldn't get moving straight.

"We were all laughing," she said. The girls beat the boys to the shore, but about 90 feet out, one of the boys stood up and the cance tipped over. "Then what happened is confusing," Boltwood said.

At first it appeared no one was in danger. Then Jones tired to sawim to shore. He made it about halfway, then started to call for help.

But then 'they started screaming for help," said Kathinya Sabero, who was on the shore. Sabero also is a DCD sophomore.

Again, because no one was sure if

the danger was real, they healtated briefly to respond. When Jones called for help again, the people on shore realized the danger. Several students, Frederick Green and DCD basketball coach Kurt Keener jumped in to help.

Reportedly, one student grabbed Jones and brough thirt to the surface three times but was unable to hald blin, according to Bloomfield Township police Lt. Jeffrey Werner. What happened to Bradley is not clear.

What happened to Brailly Is not clear.
"When the boat overturned, they all jumped out," said Sobrero. She said she saw Brailley's arm in the water, "then I saw Poul ye down."
Whether he tried to swim to shore or couldn't grap the overturned cance is not certain.
"It was just so ridiculous," said Sobrero in a volce near tears.
Judy Green said she had naked

all the teens it they could swim the fore they went on the lake. All but one boy said yes, according to Boltwood. That boy stayed on shore. Green and the students said alcohol was not involved in the inci-

Sgt. Anthony Velat of the Oak-land Sheriff's Department also haid alcohol was not considered a factor.

A neighbor, Edna Evans, said she saw that "one of the boys got away from the canne and went down. Then they both drowned."

Some of the members at the party (including Junes) were members of the DCD basketball team.

"Since the academic year has been completed and classes are no longer in session, specific plans for honoring the memory of the young men have not been finalized," the


