Tony Todd is an actor whose craft has taken him to foreign lands and strange worlds. Currently Todd can be seen (but not recognized) in his recurring role as Klingon leader Kurn in Star Trek: The Next Generation. His transformation into the washboard-headed alien means a 3 a.m. makeup call for the nearly three-hour process.

"It's not as tedious as that sounds,"
Todd says. "It actually helps you get into character. You're stiting in front of the mirror and with each layer you find yourself emerging into it."

The K'um character will be part of the upcoming Star Trek spin-off, Deep Space Nine, due in syndication in January. "Some people can say that the new generation is a cleaner universe. Well, this is the flip side of it." Todd explains. "It takes place in a penal colony, so you're going to have darker characters, a scrulfier-looking crew—the rejects."

Todd, whose feature film credits include Bird, Lean on Meand The Last Elephant, will make his next big-screen appearance opposite Virginia Madsen in the romantic thriller Candyman. He has also completed production on Excessive Force, a story of Chicago cops battling corruption. And Todd is excited about his future role in Oliver Stone's next Vietnam War epic. Stone "discovered" Todd on the stage and cast him in Platoon, a move which really fired up Todd's career.
