CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order by Mayor Hartsock at 8:00 p.m. on July 30, 1992, in Council Chambers, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan. Notice of the meeting was posted in compliance with Public Act 287-1974.

PRESENT: Campbell, McShane, Hartsock, Richardson, Tupper.

OTHERS PRESENT: City Manager Deadman, Director Lauboff, Director Billing, Adm. Assistant Schultz, City Clerk Busbey.

Minutes of the previous meetings of June 15 and June 23, 1992, were approved as written.

Minutes of other boards were received and/or filed.

Council accepted the retirement of City Clerk Busbey and appointed City Treasurer Cantrell as Acting City Clerk effective August 10 through September 22, 1992.

Council approved the closing of Shilawasee and Raphael Street for Family Day in the Park August 22, 1992.

Council authorized a Cass Court Block party on August 15 and a Birchwood Block Party on August 22, 1992.

Council appointed the Mayor as Delegate and the Mayor Pro-Tem as Alternate to the Michigan Municipal League Annual Meeting, September 23rd.

Council referred the matter of additional regulations governing the height of satellite dishes to the Planning Commission for study and recommendation.

Council granted a variance to the temporary sign provisions of the Sign Ordinance to allow Kensington Manor Apartments to repeat an open house promotion July 25 and July 26, 1992.
