

It's no contest in some races



Some candidates will appear on the ballot alone in Tuesday's primary election with no

election with no challengers.

It's your choice whether to cast a ballot for these candidates, but there are few things you should realize.

"They (candidates) are trying to get votes for a nomination. That's what voting really indicates — to put these people on the November ballot," said Farmington Hills city clerk Kathy Dornan.

But there is no requirement for the number or percentage of votes an uncontested candidate must receive in the primary. They will still be on the November ballot. "It's a matter of formality," Dornan

Construction and changes could confound the voters

Farmington Hills voters will be faced with some changes in their voting precincts — including de-tours around construction areas when they go to the polls Tuesday.

Before you leave your home or Before you leave your name wor-office to vate, look at your new vot-ets registration card to be sure you know where you are going. Also re-member that you vote at the pre-cinct for city elections, not school elections, which also is noted on your card.

In addition to precinct changes, voters also will be confronted with construction in precinct areas.

Construction on 12 Mile, and the closing of the thoroughfare between Halated and Heggerty roads, means a detour for voters going to precinct 26, Hope Lutheran Church, 39200 12 Mile. Access to the precinct must be made from the Haggerty-12 Mile interaction only. Voters must use the 12 Mile entrance at Haggerty-12 Mile and Mile interaction only. ty Road. Hope Lutheran cannot be accessed from Halsted Road.

Voters going to precincts 11 and 22 at North Fermington High School, 32900 13 Mile, must use the

Farmington Road driveway because 13 Mile is closed between Farming-ton and Orchard Lake roads. The driveway you must use is off Farm-ington Road, north of 13 Mile. No access is available off 13 Mile.
