# **Board buys time on Wooddale**



Farmington school trustees have a solution for safety problems in the parking lot of Wooddale Elementary School. However, work won't begin until construction drawings are finished and approved by the board.

The Farmington school board Tues-day directed engineering drawings be done for the parking lot and driveway at Wooddale Elementary and approved, in concept only, what has become a con-troversial solution to safety problems those

The board voted 6-0 to approve clos-ing the steep driveway that runs south and installing a two-way driveway to the west.

the west.

But trustees said they want no work done on the project until construction drawings are done and brought back to the board for approval, which is estimated to take 4-6 weeks.

"We want to buy some time if we can," said trustee Jack Cotton in making the motion. "It's important we feel confortable."

Cotton said he would like to see more Cotton said he would like to see more study of traffic problems during winter months when they are apparently at their worst, and trusteed Joseph Sovke and Susan Rennels asked school administration to look into the possibility of getting aldewalks installed in the area for additional safety.

Board treasurer Helen Ditzhary was absent for Tuesday's vote.

Problems at Wooddale include the

steep driveway and the current parking lot, which is too small. Also a problem are cars lining up off of school property to the west and south to pick up children. A group of parents sitting on a school safety committee asked for

school board help.

On the other alde of the issue are the trees, which will have to be taken down with an expansion to the west, concern with property values in the Colony Park West subdivision where there is a

Many Farmington-area politices con-sidered John J. (Jack) McDonald to be the heir apparent to replace the retiring Margaret Schaeffer as a judge of the lo-cal court.

But after
Tuesday's primary, it was apparent that
McDonald. longtime attor-ncy and former county commis-sioner, is going sioner, is going to have to have to run the race of his little between now and November if he Maria Parker wants to do a black robe and ascend to the bench of

the 47th District Court in Farmington.

Marla Parker, who already wears a robe as a magistrate in that court, gave McDonald all he could handle in the seven-candidate judical primary. And she's sure to run strong again in the No-vember general election.

Yes, McDonald topped the primary field, gathering an unofficial 4,194 votes. That was expected. It was

thought that second place — also a survivor's slot — might go to Parker...or nomeone.
That "someone" almost turned out to

be Jack McDonald.

At one point during a raucous elec-tion-night party at the Honey Tree res-taurant in northern Farmington Hills, the personable Parker shouted for qui-et, got 1t, and made an announcement.
"With four of six precincts in in Farmington and 21 of 31 in the Hills, we are running first!" exclaimed Parker, 37, holding high the No. 1 finger, Ap-plause rocked the room.

But when the varies had been count.

But when the votes had been count-ed, McDonald finished first — by 120 votes. He actually lost in Farmington Hills, 3,513 votes to 3,453, but took the city of Farmington by 180 votes.

"I don't care if I win by two votes, as long as I win," said the 52-year-old McDoneld just before midnight at his home on Appleton in Farmington Hills.

A little later, he took a phone call from Parker, "Yes, it was a close one," he told her.
