# Holocaust Center hails grant

Rabbi Charles H. Rosenzveig, founder of the Holocaust Memorial Center in West Bloomfield, said the first installment of a \$75,000 grant from the State of Michigan will be "yeary helpful." very helpful.

Rosenzveig Tuesday said the grant — to be administered by the township — will be used for maintenance and various projects at the center that he said has attracted more than 100,000 visitors so far

more than 100,000 this year.
Township Supervisor Sandra M.
Draur was notified by the Michigan
Department of Commerce, on July
31, that the \$30,845 installment ould likely be available by mid-

August.
State funding for the center, at 6602 W. Maple Road, was in ques-

tion earlier this year when Gov. John Engler reduced public assistance across the board.

State Sen, David Honigmon, however, helped restore public funding under the 1992 Michigan Equity Program allowing the Legislature to set aside money, on a competitive basis, for regional cultural activities. Under the law, the state set aside about \$1.3 million for awards to communities with populations between 40,000 and 125,001 residents.

Through the grant application from the supervisor's office, officials demonstrated the extent of regional cultural enrichment and economic benefit derived from the center. Of-ficials also said public and private support for the center.


