It says here in the Farmers' Almanac that Christmas Day comes only once each year; if you think you hear Santa's hearty guffaw on any other day, you'd better look out for an imposter...

The bidding was relatively unexciting. South had a difficult time in the 4H choice is probably the best of the evils. North's leap to 3H was well judged; if South had as little as 3 small hearts, North would've preferred the 10-trick game. But South didn't support hearts and the club game was reached.

5 clubs is actually the only makeable game (3NT obviously loses 5 spots; tricks and 4H goes down when East leads a club, ruff and back a spade for another club ruff with a trump loser left), but unfortunately South got his dates mixed.

West cashed the SK and led a diamond effectively finessing East's king; now don't look so smug. Everyone else can see that 11 tricks are frigid on a cross-ruff. But South decided it couldn't hurt to play for the overtrick, so he led the H J and let it ride. . . and so did East!

WELL, SOUTH thought he saw snowflakes and reindeer the music of sleighbells tinkled in his brain. So he yanked four rounds of trump and took a second heart finesse.

CRASH!

East grabbed the heart king and cashed three more spade tricks for down 3!

Declarer, of course, should've forgotten about the holiday season; since West has already shown up with the S K, he can scarcely have the heart king as well. South should return a spade at trick 3, ruffing, back to the D Q and ruff a third spade, then back ruffing a

diamond to ruff out the last spade; thus declarer makes 5 trump in his hand, 3 spade ruffs, 2 diamond tricks and the ace of hearts for a cinch game and East's Santa suit can go back into mothballs where it belongs.

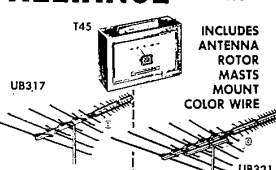

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Annual Election of the qualified electors of the aforesaid School District will be held in the Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, on Monday, June 14, 1971, at 8:00 A.M. and the following propositions will be submitted to the qualified electors of the School District:

BONDING PROPOSITION
Shall CLARENCEVILLE SCHOOL DISTRICT OF OAKLAND AND WAYNE COUNTIES, MICHIGAN, borrow the sum of not to exceed ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000.00) and use its bonds therefor, for the purpose of paying the costs of completing, remodeling, improving, refurbishing and reequipping school buildings, athletic fields and other facilities, of erecting additions to existing school buildings and of acquiring additions to school sites, of site development and improvement and of building and equipping athletic fields and playgrounds, and authority to borrow to supplement and cancel the unsecured balance of bonds in the amount of ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000.00) approved by the directors of the School District at the special election held on March 29, 1965.

The polls of election will be open from 7:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M., Local Time.

The places of voting shall be as follows:
Precinct 1: Clarenceville Junior High School
20210 Middlebelt Road
Livonia, Michigan

Precinct 2: Clarenceville Senior High School
20210 Middlebelt Road
Livonia, Michigan

Each person voting on the bonding proposition and for Board members must be a citizen of the United States, above the age of twenty-one (21) years, have resided in the State of Michigan six (6) months, and have been a resident of the School District on the 10th Friday preceding the day of election, and must be a registered elector of the School District. Only registered voters are eligible to vote.

TAKE NOTICE that the Board of Education has estimated in connection with the above mentioned bond issue, that the costs of completing, remodeling, improving, refurbishing and reequipping school buildings, athletic fields and other facilities, of erecting additions to existing school buildings and of acquiring additions to school sites, of site development and improvement and of building and equipping athletic fields and playgrounds, along with the payment of capitalized interest and costs incident to the issuance of said new bonds, all of which it is necessary to borrow by means of said bond issue, will be ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000.00).

PO-BOX-Drugs

New Woe: Double Addiction

Questions should be sent to the Community Commission on Drug Abuse, P.O. Box 100, Livonia, Mich. 48151.

Q. Isn't it true that the high cost of a heroin habit can be cut by using less expensive drugs to get by with in between fixes?

A. Yes, definitely. And this fact has led to one of the really big problems in narcotic addiction today. Many of the drugs used to get by may themselves cause a dependence or addiction.

What is happening is that multiple addictions are now more the rule than the exception. Treating a patient who is addicted not merely to heroin, but to sleeping pills and tranquilizers, and who is habituated to the use of stimulants such as amphetamines can be a nightmare.

Then too, there is a study which offers tentative evidence that people with a simple heroin addiction may be withdrawn more easily with methadone than those people who have multiple addictions. So, in effect, the high cost of a heroin habit may, in the long run, be made even more "expensive" to the individual who uses other drugs.
