Trying to contain Pontlac Northern's explosive football team for an entire game was too Talley an order for the North Farmington defense.
Two long runs in the second half, one by all-state running back Charles Talley, lifted the Huskies to a 20-7 victory Saturdey over host North.
It was the third consecutive season opener in which the Reiders lost to Pontlac, and Talley, who rushed for 134 yards on 18 carries this time, played a big role in all three games.
"Speed kills," North coach Jim O'Leary said. "That's the rule of thumb whether you're on the highway or the football field. We knew our secondary was suspect, and we didn't come up and tackle well."

Those long runs helped give the Huskies a 266-yeard rushing total and 357 in total offense. North had 105 of its 160 yards on the ground, with senior tallback Todd Anderson getting 88 on 23 attempts.

The Lakers took advantage of their depth (50 players are listed on the roster) and substituted freely throughout the game. West Bloomfield scored once in each quarter with a different player taking it in each time.
