Lawrence Technological University recently unveiled its billion dollar African development project during an exhibition in the Southfield Pavilion.

University architecture students and faculty presented 160 drawings and 22 models for a planned project on the African Savanna Islands.

Among the guests attending the exhibition were the Ugandan Ambassador to the United States, S.T.K. Katusiye, Southfield government officials, potential investors and representatives of LTU.

LTU's College of Architecture and Design undertook the massive project as a practical "hands-on" experience.

worked on the effort, done in conjunction with the Pan-African Development Corporation and African Continental Enterprises.

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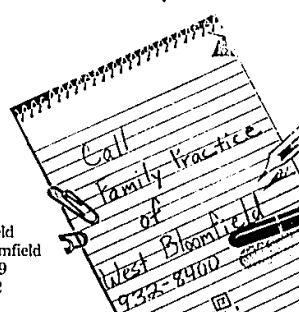
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
