

After-school enrichment courses return this month

Children in Farmington-area elementary schools will once again have the opportunity to attend after-school enrichment classes at their schools.

Beginning later this month, all 13 elementary schools will have a variety of class offerings.

Children's Community Education, which served over 2,000 elementary students in more than 200 classes last year, continues to expand enrichment offerings.

Each school has a slightly different selection of classes. Children can attend any class at any location as long as they are preregistered.

Registration is on going at the Farmington Community School, 30415 Shilawasee, corner of Tuck and Shilawasee. Brochures, which were sent home through the schools earlier in the month, have a full listing of classes and locations.

Following is a partial listing of enrichments offered:

- **Art A La Carte** — Learn pottery, painting, drawing and crafts. Each session will feature a different project. Develop creativity and confidence using a wide variety of art materials.

- **The Grand Party** — Calling all grandparents and "significant other" senior adults. A wonderful night is planned for you and your

grandchildren. Come to a special 1½ hour party filled with music, dancing, refreshments and good times for all ages. A memorable picture available.

- **Storybook Art** — Use children's stories and literature as a basis for creating two and three dimensional art projects. Children will learn art techniques, mix colors, make pottery, and use art to tell a story.

- **Living Science Foundation** — Scientific fun for the whole family. Children, parents and grandparents welcome. Come for a one-hour class or stay for the entire four-hour program. Program includes: Scaly Sur-

vivors, Story of Life, To Fly and Animal Family Introduction.

- **Musical Keyboarding For Kids** — Students learn basic rhythms, notes and techniques on the keyboard. They will also learn to play new pop sounds from the radio. No experience needed.

- **Hooked on Books** — Taught by a reading specialist. Students learn what it takes to get "Hooked on Books." The use of motivational materials such as comic books, rap songs and puppets promote enjoyment in reading.

A public hearing is scheduled to determine the need for a special assessment district for watermain installation in Biddlestone Woods subdivision. In unfinished business, the council will consider enactment of a rezoning request from light industrial to general business at 29199 Orchard Lake; and a zoning text amendment regulating area of accessory buildings.

The council will consider intro-

duction of an ordinance to add a new section to the city code to define and regulate the crime of retail fraud committed in a store open to the public; and an ordinance for streets, sidewalks, drainage courses, obstructions, for increasing diverting flow to clarify the application of such sections.

The council will consider appointments to boards and commissions and will consider the award of a contract for safety improvements on Orchard Lake Road at the Orchard Place Shopping Center, between 12 and 14 Mile roads. The council also will consider approval to convey the city's position to the state Legislature on a proposed package of new ethics legislation, as

requested by councilman Ben Marks.

The driver of the 1992 Mercury, a 58-year-old Birmingham man, was ticketed for failing to yield, said po-

lice Capt. Richard Patterson.

The driver was stopped at a red light at southbound Woodward and Lincoln when he apparently pulled forward to make a right hand turn, Patterson said.

"The bicyclist had the green light and the walk sign," he said.

lance to Troy Beaumont Hospital by request of his mother and was treated and released later the same day, said a hospital spokeswoman.

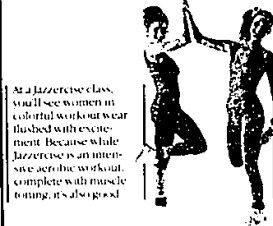
