A six-member jury has found a Farmington Hills father guilty of assault and battery in connection with a fight that broke out among adults at a Little League game in June 1991.

III MAN FINED

High tech proved the undoing of a Farmington Hills man when he was ordered to pay almost \$1,000 in fines to the city's cable provider, MetroVision, according to MetroVision officials

Acting on an anonymous tip from one of its aubscribers, MetroVision, through a cable theft investigation service called The Network, was able to have charges levied against the man for illegal possession and useage of a black acrombler boz.

"It certainly couldn't have been worth it for him," said Tom Bjorklund, MetroVision's regional manager. "For that amount he could have subscribed to our service legally for several years."

The man was ordered to pay fine in 47th District Court.

MetroVision, which serves Farmington, Farmington Hills, Novi, Livonia and Redford, has more than 30 active investigations and is currently prosecuting two cases, to-tailing nearly \$370,000 cash each, in federal court.

Michigan law states that onyone involved in attering telecommunications service equipment owned, controlled or operated by another person, is guilty of a misdemeanor, and may be punished by a maximum one year in prison and \$500 fine.

"This is a very serious problem for cable operators and subscribers adike," Bjorklund seid.

Anyone with information on cable theft may call MetroVision at \$55-7000 or The Network at 1-800-241-5699. The Network is a clearinghouse for information on unauthorized reception and sale of cable television services. Cellers are Interviewed by phone. Their identity is not revealed. Tipsters may receive cash rewards of \$25-\$300.

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
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
