A survival helicopter will be one hand, as will an antique fire truck, and other fire equipment. Farmington Hills police crime prevention personnel also will be distributing educational materials. Children also can practice making emergency 911 calls so they know what to do in case of emergency, while parents can get their blood pressure checked free of charge. The Jaws of life rescue equipment also will be demonstrated.
