Detroit Mayor Coleman A. Young says he is ready to work with which ever candidate Oakland voters elect

"I'm ready to work with anybody if that means better things for the region," Young, a Democrat, said-last week at the farewell dinner for outgoing executive Daniel T. Murphy, who is retiring at the end of this year.
Young and Murphy bave had somewhat parallel public careers as

the chief executives of their respec-tive communities. Young's tenture as mayor of De-troit started in 1973, when he de-feated Republican John F. Nichola, now Oakland County sheriff. Mur-phy's started the next year when he defeated Democrat Eugene W. Ku-thy.

Since then, both have been unbeatable.

Young sald he and Murphy worked together on numerous proj-

ects of mutual concern over the dec-ndes. "We didn't always agree, but we always did what we thought was

best."
Young said the quality he admired most about Murphy was integrity. "When he gave his word, you could count on it... you could take it to the oank."

Later, in response to questions from reporters, Young said he looks forward to a cooperative relationship with whomever succeeds Mur-

phy — a position he has stated previously.

That cooperative approach won't change, Young said, merely if the Patterson — who has frequently bashed Detroit and its mayor. Patterson is vying with Democrat Elizabeth "Betty" Howe in the Nov. Dugan charges that, if cut and against first-time home buyers and cap is voted in on Nov. 3, the state senior citizens, among others. government would reimburse the
