Reactive resin, an outer shell material, is another form of Urethane. It is a softer and more durable cover stock and is different than the Urethane we are familiar with.

The reactive resin is a non-porous finish. This could be compared to putting silcks on the wheels of a race car, It gives you more traction and a better grip on the lanes.
