two half-court basketball courts, four sand volleyball courts and four horseshoe courts will be offered. None of the fields will be

lighted.
That's not to mention picnic areas, play equipment, tennis court, a pond that will be devel-oped for irrigation, as well as rec-reation, such as ice skating in the

winter.
Bridges also will be built over streams on the park. An open play area where families can fly kites, for example, will be built, as well as trails around the perimeter of

or cample, win can be perimeter of the park.

"The idea is that you can bring your whole family from your woncest to your senior citizen.

There is an activity here for everyone," Jacokes said.

A contest will again be held to determine a name for the new park, which was bought Sept. 11 from Glen Eden Lutheran for

\$3.89 million.

The city used a \$2 million Michigan National Resources Land Trust Fund grant to buy the land. Grant money will be given to the city over the next two years, and money will be borrowed to pay the tab. Repayment will come from the park tax.

In addition to receiving the master plan for the park Monday, the city council approved a \$543,000 contract for construction of the first phase of development.

The Farmington Hills Planning Commission will consider approval of the sod farm master plan at a \$30 p.m. meeting Thursday, Oct. 15, in council chambers, 31555 11 Mile.

Money for the first phase comes from the city's half-mill eight-year parks tax. But the lowest bid is still \$100,000 over what was budgeted. That will come from money left in last year's special

tax fund, which is available be-cause not all that was budgeted for senior citizen activities was

for senior citizen activities was spent.

"It won't affect this year's budget regarding millage activities," said City Manager William Costick.

The first phase will include three full-sized soccer fields, three Little Leegue ball diamonds, an entranceway and road, parking fot for 240 cars, found sand volleyball courts, two half-court basketball courts, one boccie ball court, two shuffle board courts, and decorative fencing along Eight Mile.

Asphalt acceleration and decol-

Asphalt acceleration and deceleration lanes and entranceway, flag pole and islands similar to those at Heritage Park also will be built in the first phase.

Costick questioned the wisdom of building the boccie ball and shuffleboard courts because of the

lack of equipment for the games.
"I really question whether people will bring shuffleboard equipment to the park."
Councilwoman Nancy Bates suggested that park patrons could place a deposit and pick up equipment at eity hall.
Cost estimates for a public bathroom at the park were not included in the park plan because they were unavailable. But councilman Terry Sever inslated that even in phase one, a bathroom should be included." I am about but they be prosed to that," he saif, referring to portable toilets.
Costick said a bathroom could

Costick said a bathroom could be financed with general furdi money, which could be repaid from the park tax later.

"I would not be happy to take the money out of the general fund," councilman Ben Marks said.
