The Big Red Machine demolished yet another football opponent Friday.
Westland John Glenn made it six straight without a loss before a large homecoming erowd, scoring a convincing 24-0 win over challenger North Farmington.
Glenn has now outscored the opposition 227-221 for the season, and in the process clinched the Lukes Division crown and a berth in the Western Lukes Activities Association championship game against the winner of Friday's Livonia Franklin-Walled Lake Western game.
The Rockets won convincingly despite two turnovers and nine penalties for 96 yards.

"These mistakes didn't hurt us to

Anderson had 52 at halftime, but hall little room to run in the second half.



The big Salem spurt was keyed by senior guard Lealie Gotts, who scored 11 of her 15 points in the third quarter. Gotts led several Salem fast breaks, which was the key to the sec-

Farmington's Buha best golfer in WLAA

Even the rain couldn't dampen Livonia Steven-son's parade Thursday as the Spartans captured the Western Lakes Activities Association boys golf championship at Hudson Mills Metropark near

Stevenson, two strokes behind last year's team champ Plymouth Canton, relied on its senior class to overhaul second place Farmington and individual WLAA medalist Jason Buha, 114-424.

North Farmington and Northville finished third and fourth with 425 and 428, respectively, in the 12-school field. (See statistical summary.)

Under occasional showers, the par-71 course played long and tough. The greens were also fast. That didn't effect the talented Buha, one of the state's top golfers, who led Farmington and all competitors with a 3-over 74.

But Stevenson showed more balance, led by senior Mark Peterson, who finished four individually with an 80.

The Spartans also received sterling efforts from Ryan Gusick (82), Todd Lensing (83), Chris Deren (84) and Mark Magnusson (84) — all seniors.

"Everybody kept their scores down and nobody blew up, that was the key," said Peterson, who was fifth a year ago. "It rained for awhile and it got kind
