

Pankow sparks CC win over Rice

Sunday afternoon's 48th annual Boys' Bowl game was a matter of give and take for Catholic Central and Brady Pankow.

The Shamrock senior played a key role in CC's exciting 14-7 victory over arch rival Birmingham Brother Rice before some 6,000 fans at Wiener Stadium. It marked CC's third straight victory over Rice and its seventh win in their last eight meetings.

"It was a vintage Boys Bowl," said CC coach Tom Marsh, whose team is 6-0 overall. "It took you way back to the great games that went right down to the wire. Both teams played valiantly."

And perhaps the prince of val-

ancy was Pankow.

Pankow not only gave CC a second-half spark, but some outstanding punt returning, but literally took away what many thought was going to be a Rice touchdown late in the game.

Here's what happened.

Rice trailed by a touchdown and had the ball on its own 40-yard line with 1:53 remaining in the fourth quarter. Rice quarterback Derek Canine hit junior tailback Marcus Harvey with a screen pass.

Harvey — one of the quickest backs underfoot — broke the clear down the left sideline and appeared to be on his way towards a tying touchdown. Pankow came from the opposite side of the field and pulled Harvey out of bounds

at the CC 6-yard line with 50 seconds left.

The Shamrock defense then stonewalled the Warriors over the next four plays. The goal-line stand was monumental, but it was all made possible by Pankow's play on Harvey.

"He (Harvey) busted through the line and I just paraded," said Pankow. "I caught him from behind. I don't know how. I must have had the angle on him, or something. But I wasn't going to let him score."

Rice managed a 7-0 halftime lead on the strength of Canine's 6-yard touchdown pass to Mike Sullivan. The score capped a 19-play drive that consumed over eight minutes of the half.

While Rice controlled the first

half, CC regained momentum right away in the second half.

The Shamrocks took advantage of Pankow's 35-yard punt return to score early in the third quarter. The tying touchdown was a 3-yard run by Fred Taylor.

Catholic Central tallied the eventual game-winning touchdown on a 12-yard pass from quarterback Chris Barbara to fullback Jason Krueger.

CC had only 136 total yards in the game, including a 72-yard rushing effort by Taylor. Rice (2-7) had a more balanced offense by rushing for 95 yards and passing for 97 (192 total).

"We gave them a run for their money," said Rice coach Al Francis. "But you have to give CC credit. It was a good Boys' Bowl."

Falcons challenge but fall shy, 21-13

Plymouth Salem began a new football season Saturday and boasts a perfect record after turning back host Farmington 21-13.

Huh? New season? In Week Six?

After losing three of five games, the Rocks took a fresh approach to their final four — all against comparable opponents.

"Our goal was to create a new, four-game season," Salem coach Tom Moshimer said. "If we could win those four, we would consider (the year) a success."

Salem, 2-2 in the Lakes Division and 3-3 overall, was evenly matched by an inspired Farmington team that played well before a homecoming crowd despite the need to make many personnel adjustments.

The Falcons, 0-4 and 0-6, were minus six two-way starters. Two running backs were on suspension, four receivers didn't play after failing to show for practice Friday and two linemen were injured early in the game.

"If you knew what we played with, you'd be amazed," Farmington coach Bernie Call said, adding the many new starters there was a lot of growing pains.

The Rocks, who were minus running backs Andy Szylowski (thigh bruise) and Brandon Walton (knee), came right back with a 3-yard TD run by Scott Evans.

The halftime score was 7-7, as Farmington was hurt by penalties (eight for 80 yards) and the Rocks by turnovers (three) in the first half.

The Hawks won a double dual Thursday over Farmington 82-41 and host Walled Lake 66-37. Harrison is 4-3.

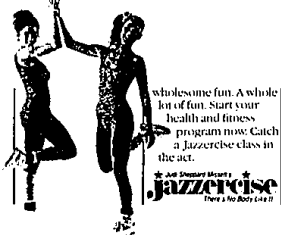
