The Shamrock defense then stonewalled the Warriors over the next four plays. The goal-line stand was monumental, but it was all made possible by Pankow's play on Harvey.

Rice managed a 7-0 helitime lead on the strength of Canine's 6-yard touchdown pass to Mike Sullivan. The score capped a 19-play drive that consumed over eight minutes of the half.
