A: Another reader, Sylvia Cotton from Carthage, Texas, has also in-quired about Davis, and I'll try to answer all the questions.

Tragically, Davis' life was cut short earlier this year by complications arising from AIDS. He was probably best known for his brilliant turn in 1978's Midnight Express, which gar-nered a best-screenplay Oscar for Oliver Stone. His intense portrayal of American Billy Hayes, who was tortured in a Turkish prison for years after being caught drug-smuggling, was most effective. As mentioned, he also portrayed the late Robert Kennedy in a 1985 miniseries titled Robert Kennedy and His Times.

Q: Many years ago, possibly in the tate '70s, I saw a Lee Marvin movie in the theater, but I have never seen it again. He played a mobster who was in conflict with another gang.
