# Drill puts hospitals' EMS operations through paces

It wasn't a disaster, but it helped area medical personnel prepare for one.

Providence Hospital, South-field, participated in a Hospi-tal Emergency Medical system disaster drill Wednesday, testing emergency response capabilities in southern Oakulnd and Wayne Counties.

The mock drill anticipated a chemical explosion near De-troit Metro Airport. Twenty-five students from

O.E. Dunckel Middle School, Farmington Hills were among those who volunteered as "pa-tients". An expert makeup di-rector painted their artificial wounds.

Medical personnel treated the event as an actual emer-gency. It wasn't known when, or how many patients would arrive, or to what extent they would be injured.

The drill tested HEMS, the medical control authority for

western Wayne County. Because of the potentially large number of people who could be injured in an actual emergency, some wounded were shipped to Providence and Propvidence Park, Novi, testing the capability of emergency rooms throughout the area to handle a major disaster.

Providence conducts at least four mock disaster drills per year in cooperation with HEMS and the Oakland Coun-ty Emergency Medical System.

## Wife, stepson plead guilty in murder of missing man

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The wife and atepson of Gustav
Prilepok, the West Bloomfield
man who vanished from his home
in Pebruary 1991 and whose body
has never been found, pleaded
guilty Tuesday in Oakland County Circuit Court on charges connected with his death.

The pleas were made by Czechspeaking co-defendants Jana Prilepok and Jan Boret, the victim's
wife and stepson, respectively, before Circuit Judge Jessies Cooper,
according to a court spokesman.
He said the process took about
two hours for each defendant, who
each pleaded with the assistance
of a courtroom interpreter.
"It was a very lengthy process,"
said Oakland County assistant
procecuting attorney Lawrence
Bunting Friday. "She admitted
she helped cover up the crime and
he (Borek) admitted he stabbed
him (Prilepoke) in the neck."
Bunting credited the West
Bloomfield Police Department for
its thorough investigation in the
months after Prilepoke, disappearance — primarily in obtaining written confessions from the
two defendants.

cers took, they made the case for us," Bunting said Friday, "It's very hard to do a case like this when you have no body."

The co-defendants face sentencing next month before Copper. Borek, charged with second-degree murder, will be sentenced at 1:30 p.m. Nov. 12 while Jann Prilepok will be sentenced at 1:30 p.m. Nov. 19 on the charge of accessory after the fact.

Borek could be sentenced to life in prison, although Bunting said the recommended state sentencing guidélines for someone with no previous criminal record, such as Borek, is 5-15 years. Prilepok, meanwhile, could get anywhere from probation to five years in prison. Although she is now free bond, her attorney said he thinks deportation is likely.

John Skrzynski, Prilepok's Detroit-based attorney, said he hoped the judge would consider the eight months in jail already spent by his client in delivering the length of sentence.

He said his client pleaded guilty "because that's what she wanted to do. She admitted what

she had done."
Borek's attorney, William
Hatchett, could not be reached for
comment.

Although Bunting said he still believes the co-defendants killed Prilepok the night of Feb. 7, 1991

— a killing later determined as having taken place by 48th District Judge Edward Avadenka—for the victim's money. Originally, the defendants told police Pritpok left for his job that evening but never reached his destination.

"They didn't admit Prilepok was killed until after they learned that they could not inherit the property (including Prilepok's West Bloomfield home) for seven years," Bunting said.

But Skrzynski Friday insisted the murder was not premeditated, but an "unfortunate" tragedy that escalated from a heated argument between the victim and his step-

"These were people who barely spoke English," the attorney said. "And their background was in a totalitarian system, where the po-lice and the government were monsters, . .
