

When the season started, North Farmington coach Norm Stan-iszewski figured his girls tennis team would do well to finish with a .500

But the Raiders were much better than their preseason expectations and confirmed that by winning the Western Lakes Activities Association tournament and overall championship last week.

It was the first title since 1988 for North, which scored 23 tournament points to finish shead of Walled Lake Central (20) and defending champ Parmington Hills Harrison (18).

"This is one of the more satisfying years, mainly because I don't think the kids thought they were going to do that well at the beginning." Stanizewski said.

The dual-meet and tournament results count 50 percent each toward the overall title. The Raiders finished 10-0-1 in duals, Central 9-0-2 and Harrison 9-2-0. Teams earn one point for each victory, half a point for each tie.

Anderson paces North gridiron victory

TOdd Anderson was already assured a place in North Farmington football annals, but he carved out a special honor for himself Saturday.
The senior tailback became the first running back in school history to rush for 1,000 yards in two consecutive seasons as the Raiders routed visiting Farmington 33-6.
That's quite an achievement considering players such as Mike Gow, Scott Selzer, Brad Pease, Joe Sturtz and Jim Accitelli carried the ball for North in previous years.
"I've had two great lines the last two years," said Anderson, who has a 3,97 grade-point average and hopes to study medicine in college. "When they open holes like that, it's not hard toget 1,000 yards.
"I don't have blazing speed, but I can read a hole pretty well. I'm not a power runner, but I can cut back pretty well."
Anderson rushed for 179 yards and two touchdown on 28 carries against the Falcons, pushing his season total to 1,033. He gained 1,175 last year.
"When I saw him play JV football, I knew he was going to be good," Farmington coach Bernie Call said. "I think he's the best back in the conference.

The Raiders, with Anderson carrying the ball, set a definite course on their first possession.

Anderson got the call on 11 of the 13 plays as North drove 78 yards to take a 7-0 lead on Anderson's 2-yard run and Ryan Meredith's extra-point kick.

North converted a fumble recovery and blocked punt into TDs, also, and jumped in front 21-0 before the first quarter was over.

"For some reason, we're just afraid of them," said Call, who was disappointed by his team's lack of intensity early in the game. "We started nine seniors in the first half, hoping that wouldn't happen.

"We stood around and watched them — and they're a good football team. If you do that, they're going to cream you — and they did."

The Falcons fumbled on first down following Anderson's TD, giving North the ball at the Farmington 25. A holding penalty nullified a David Zietz-to-Adam Kammer TD pass, but Rob Chuba ran 28 yards on a reverse two plays later for another score. Ryan Moore blocked a Farmington punt near midfield and Kammer returned it to the opposing 5. Fullback Jason Kong scored on first down with 19 seconds left in the opening period. "When you have a team that's not having much success and you get them down early, they tend to let up." North coach Jim O'Leary said. "If you leave them in the ballgame, the more confident they get."

The Raiders led 27-0 at halfitme following a 1-yard keeper by quarterback Zietz, who has replaced senior
