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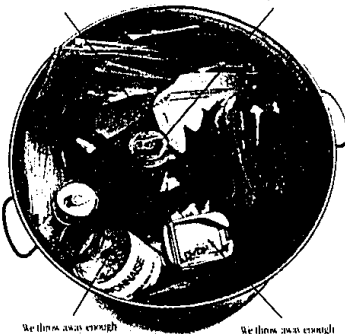

HERE ARE SOME TIPS:

- Flu symptoms in children are familiar: Fever, non-productive cough, headache, muscle ache and sore throat. The symptoms may last as long as two weeks.
- Children without chronic illness do not require flu vaccine.
- A small percentage of children do need flu vaccine to avoid serious complications of flu. Those with asthma, heart disease, anemia or diabetes should receive a flu shot.
- In households with such high-risk children, all others should also be vaccinated.
- Flu epidemics occur in Michigan from October through April, peaking in December. Vaccination, if needed, should be given from mid-October to November.
