"Small sensors pick up impulses from the muscle triggering the hand to open or close," explained Jerry Walter, a Southfield resident who is the present Chief Barker and self-proclaimed "Variety Club junkie."

Another project is the Children's Hospital of Michigan where Tent 5 has provided ECK-MO, a heart-lung machine to keep newborns breathing.
