JASON Buha has achieved many successes during his budding golf career, but perhaps none were more covered than the title he won Saturday at the Class A finale in East Lensing. The Farmington High senior added a state championship by winning the two-day tournment at Forest Akers Golf Course with a three-over-par 146.

"There's no better way to end my high school career," said Buha, who had a disappointing finals as a sophomore and was runner-up last year.
"This was my last shot, and light and id did it before I left high school. You only get four shots at it, and I capitalized on at least one opportunity. It's nice to put that on my resume."

"When I got off the 18th green, when it was official, it wore off quick. I had so many people come up to congratulate me, and every time it made me remember how great the last three holes were."

Buha said many of those people saked if winning the state championship was any more important to him than his victory last year in the prestigious Ben Hogan tournament.
