In this highly unusual and often confusing election year, it's hard to imagine anyone getting excited about the race for two seats on the University of Michigan Board of Regents.

But that's exactly what they were doing at the Birmingham house of Shelley and Jeff Roberts last Monday evening as local board candidate Larry Deitch schmoozed with a cadre of compatriots, making a case for his candidacy.

Deitch, a Birmingham Democrat, plans to spend about \$30,000 running against major party contenders Rebecca McGowan, Nancy Laro and incumbent Neal Nielsen for two eight-year terms on the board of regents, the governing body of U-M.

Deitch grew up in Detroit and graduated from Mumford High School. He went on to get degrees in history (1969) and law (1972) from U-M. He currently practices

law with a Southfield firm. His daughter, Sarah, is a sophomore at U-M.

Roberts said that Deitch is "one of my oldest and best friends since the eighth grade (when) we were dishwashers together in summer camp," then joked, "I can tell you (about) all the skeletons in his closet."

Maybe the hardest part of Deitch's campaign is that "most people don't know what a regent is," he said.

Indeed, one of Deitch's campaign workers, Helen Katz, said that when Deitch attended a U-M alumni gathering, the people were "trying to understand what a regent is and what a regent does. It's really surprising to me that people ask really basic questions."

Deitch has never run for office before, but is treasurer of the

Michigan Democratic Party, serves on the Michigan Civil Service Commission, and formerly served on Gov. James Blanchard's commission on welfare reform.

Where U-M is concerned, Deitch said that, if elected, he'll try to:

■ "prevent the continuing escalation of tuition."

■ run the university more like a business, particularly in light of declining state revenues.

■ and "give professors incentive to be great teachers (because) if there's anything that needs work, it's undergraduate education."

Ken Cheyne of Bloomfield Hills was one of perhaps 50 people of 400 invited who showed up at the couple's house Monday.

OU seeks state OK for tech building

A proposed \$39 million science and technology building is Oakland University's first priority in capital outlay projects approved by the Board of Trustees Oct. 1.

The projects will be submitted to the state Department of Management and Budget as the university's priority list for the 1993-94 year.

OU is in the next-to-last phase of approvals for the science building. It now seeks authorization for working draw-

ings for the building and the final step will be approval to start construction.

Other top priorities for the university include: \$798,000 for replacement of North Foundation Hall absorber and air conditioning of South Foundation Hall; \$833,000 to air condition Hannah Hall of Science; \$1.7 million for 10 projects ranging from work on electrical switch gears and fire alarm systems to classroom and Lepley Sports Center renovations.

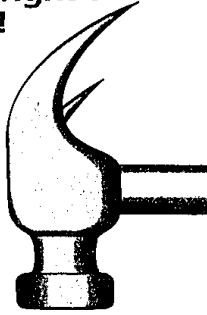
