He and Doug Coult, Keith's friend and helper in all his experiments, said they had the "full cooperation of teachers, administrators, maintenance people and counselors" but couldn't get the other seniors at FHS to sign up for a special class next year that would work exclusively on research, as he did this year, using his experimental data and the book of reports as a base.

"They could do some of the things we didn't have time to do," Keith said, "like seeing what kind of parasites are in the water and fish and boiling down the water samples to see what types of solids are in it. It would be a lot more interesting than regular science classes-but we couldn't get anybody in the class interested."

Keith is the son of Arthur and Evelyn Verner of Farmington and has two younger brothers, Kevin, who attends East Junior High, and Kipp, a student at Middlebelt Elementary School. He also has a sister, Kim, who is finishing her junior year at Harrison High. The Verners moved to Farmington only last summer from Chicago, where Keith also worked on scientific research.

The young ecologist said he plans to major in medicine eventually but will spend this summer working at Ford Motor Co. to earn funds for college in the fall. He'll be attending classes at Central Michigan University, Ypsilanti, in a pre-med curriculum, and said he'd like to apply for an exchange study program to England or some other country overseas.

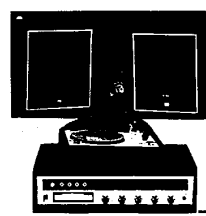
