DLS 35, Harrison 27: Jeff Cialo was on target Friday night for Farmington Harrison. Problem was, so were a few players for Warren DeLaSalle.

The Hawks couldn't avoid their first losing season since 1972, falling to the Pilots 35-27 at Rossville Memorial Field to end 4-5. DeLaSalle finishes 6-3.

Cialo sparked most of the game, completing 11 of 18 passes for 186 yards, three for touchdowns.

He connected with Keye Smith on a 29-yard scoring toss in the first quarter, with Nick Burgess on an

other 29-yard TD toss in the second quarter and with Nick Williams on a 20-yarder in the third quarter.

But two fumbles also proved costly for the Hawks.

The first came on a fumbled snap late in the first half. DeLaSalle recovered at the Harrison 39 and, with one minute left in the half, quarterback Steve Teodecki plunged the final yard for the touchdown, giving the Pilots a 35-21 lead.

Obviously, it was a crazy first half. Harrison narrowed the gap to 35-27 with 3:20 left in the third quarter on Cialo's pass to Williams. But in the final quarter, after driving to the DeLaSalle 35, Cialo lost a second fumble. The Hawks never got close again.

Salem eliminates CC in soccer

Tom Baker was being too modest when he said he's not very good at shooting a soccer ball.

He converted two direct free kicks Saturday to give Plymouth Salem a 2-0 lead and propel the Rocks to a 5-0 victory over Redford Catholic Central in the Class A regional final at Centennial Educational Park.

"There's a lot of luck on those shots, especially when that's not the best thing I do," Baker said, adding he was just trying to hit around the wall. "I'm not a great shooter. I guess I concentrated well; I was into the game."

The Rocks (17-2) will play Grand Haven in a state semifinal game 3 p.m. Wednesday at Okemos High School. The Catholic League champion Shamrocks finished with a 16-3-2 record.

If the Shamrocks can't win the state title, the Rocks would be CC coach Phil LaJoy's next choice.

He coached many of the Salem varsity players in an undefeated JV season in 1990 before going to CC.

"They have a great team and a great program," he said. "Tommy Baker is a tremendous player. He found the corners and put them in the net."

"I don't feel real good right now because we lost, but that's the game. I congratulate them and wish them the best."

The first half was a stalemate as both teams had an equal number of scoring chances. Then, five minutes into the second half, Baker broke the ice when he netted the first free kick.

A turning point occurred at 24:45 when CC's Rich Wales received a red card for a foul on Salem's Brad Jaskolski.

Not only did Baker convert the free kick again, aiming for the upper right corner, but the Sham-

Harrison also got a 5-yard scoring run from Scott Gurke in the second quarter that tied the score at 21. Mark Gletzer's fumble recovery set up the score.

But the Hawks' defense did little else against DeLaSalle. Jim Cunningham rushed nine times for 123 yards, scoring on runs of 21 and 3 yards, before leaving the game with an injury in the first half.

Matt Mlynarek took over for Cunningham; he gained 125 yards on 27 attempts and scored on runs of 12 and 15 yards.

Teodecki also completed four of five passes for 92 yards as DeLaSalle gained 365 yards to Harrison's 249.

rocks were forced to play a man short the rest of the game.

"We got fortunate," Baker said. "I put those two in and their team seemed to fall apart after the red card."

"We lost Richie and it was over," LaJoy said. "At that point it was 1-0. It's one of those things. You can't play Salem down two goals and down a player."

Salem was in control after that. Joe Perron got behind a defender three minutes later to make it 3-0.

Scott Backus scored the fourth goal at 16:30, and Ronny Mashni added a breakaway goal with two minutes left.

"After they got the red card, the missing man makes all the difference," Salem coach Ken Johnson said. "The way we play, quick with a lot of passing, made it inevitable. It opens all kinds of channels for a goal."

"The score is not a reflection of the real game. It just deteriorated. The first half was a nail-biter."

Hopkins selects Lake Superior

Heather Hopkins has been a four-year starter and a prime reason for Farmington Hills Harrison's transformation into a competitive girls basketball team.

The 6-foot-1 senior hopes to have the same kind of career at Lake Superior State University as she has playing for the Hawks.

Hopkins has given the Lakers a verbal commitment and will officially accept their scholarship offer later when she signs a letter-of-intent form this month.

"One of the reasons I chose a Division II school is that I want to be an impact player right away," she said. "I want to help improve the team's record, and I think I can be a dominating freshman in the league."

Lake Superior was 9-7 and finished fourth in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference last year.

"They're going to need a forward," said Hopkins, who turned down offers from Western Michigan, Ferris State and Hillsdale.

"They have a real good player right now in Chris Nance, who was freshman of the year in the GLIAC. A lot of teams will be concentrating on her, which should leave me open."

Hopkins has played center for much of her career, but she's a versatile player who should have no trouble playing on the perimeter. She often brings the ball upcourt for the Hawks and has an outside shot.

"She should be able to play inside or outside for them," Harrison coach Pete Mantyla said. "I think she can step in and be a good player in that league. They were excited about getting her."

"She'll be an asset to their program, because she has such great character. I feel fortunate that my most talented player is also a

great kid. That made my life easier as a new varsity coach (last year)."

Hopkins scored an average of 10, 21 and 17 points in three previous seasons at Harrison and has more than 1,000 total. She is averaging 16 points, eight rebounds, three blocks and three steals this year.

The distance between home and Lake Superior in Sault Ste. Marie was not a major consideration in her decision, Hopkins said.

"I like the small-school setting where the town is involved in the school," she said. "I want to be a person, not a number."

The Lakers will play road games at Wayne State, Oakland University, Hillsdale, Saginaw Valley and Northwood.

"The girls and I are looking forward to going out and supporting her and being her fans," Mantyla said.

Senior center Heather Hopkins scored a game-high 14 points for Harrison, which got all of its points from three players. Krista Snow added 10 and Amanda Ault eight.

Alyson Nouns, who sank a pair of triples, and Amy Westerhold had 10 points apiece to lead Canton. Kelly Holmes chipped in seven and Stephanie Gray, the team's leading scorer who had a down week in that regard with 11 points in two games, five.

"We can do a little better job of getting (Gray) the ball, and she can do a better job of moving in the post," Blohm said. "But she's solid; she'll get that worked out."

"But we do need that balance. I thought Jori (Welchans) stepped

up again and did a good job handling the ball and rebounding. Amicie (Crayton) and Kelly did a good job in the post."

"At the start of the third quarter, Westerhold did a good job pressuring their guards, got some turnovers and scores. That got us going again."

Hopkins, scoring two easy layups off back-door passes, got the Hawks within 25-21 early in the third quarter.

"We had some spots where we broke down against the screen-and-roll, but that was partly my fault," Blohm said, adding he liked the Canton defensive effort overall.

"It was just a matter of how we were going to rotate, and I don't think we made it real clear. That will be something we can work on

the next three days."

Westerhold scored the first two Canton baskets of the third quarter, Nouns hit a second three and drove the lane for another basket and Welchans capped the rally with a deuce, putting the Chiefs in front 34-21.

The Hawks closed to 35-26 at the end of the quarter and 35-30 in the fourth. Canton scored six unanswered points for an 11-point advantage while Harrison was scoreless for six minutes.

"We're looking forward to some good competition and the (playoff) challenge," Blohm said. The Chiefs play host to Walled Lake Western Thursday. "Hopefully, we'll continue to have the energy we had against Salem and Harrison. It's a good way to end the (regular) season."
