Prosecutor nailed for too white staff

Oakland County Prosecutor Richard Thompson came under fire last week for not having enough black assistants among his 89-person staff.

Hubert Price, the only black member of the Oakland County Board of Commissioners, accused Thompson of not doing enough to hire blacks and "alleviate the widespread perception the pro-secutor's office as a bastion of rac-ism."

About seven percent of the county's population is black and about 40 percent of the jail population is black, Price noted during a meeting of the county board's

personnel committee Wednesday.
But only two of 89 assistant
prosecutor's are black, the Pontiac Democrat said during a discussion on the status of minorities
within the county's 3,500 workforce.

Informed of the allegations,
Thompson said he does not apo-logize for his hiring policies or record. "We hire the best talent available ... black, white or Hispanic."
Thompson said Price's com-ments were at least partly motivated by politics. "He didn't mention other county depart-ments have worse records than ours on affirmative action.
"Furthermore, he prefaced his comments with a pitch for Bill

Clinton and Al Gore. It was an obvious political ploy."

One who apparently agrees is Commissioner Marilyn E. Gosling, R.Bloomfield Hills, who is chairman of the personnel committee.

"I was appalled at the tone" of newspaper articles on our discussion on affirmative action, Gosling wrote in a letter sent to the presecutor Friday. "In my opinion, you have acted on every suggestion offered to hire black attorneys and have gone the extra mile to do so."

Thompson received another vote of confidence last August from newly appointed Judge Denise Langford-Morris, Oakland's only black circuit judge

nompson as an assistant, pre-secutor.
During an interview with The Observer & Eccentric Newspa-pers, Langford-Morris credited Thompson — and his predeces-sor, then prosecutor L. Brooks Petterson — with helping her get a sound legal background.

They treated her like all other assistant prosecutors, Langford-Morris said. "They worked us very hard," she said, "something that helped my development as an attorney."

Langford-Morris was appointed by Republican Gov. John Engler on the recommendation of Patter-son.

Senator attacks state for anti-parent bias

A state Senate committee chair has joined critics of the so-called Michigan Model for health educa-tion, attacking state officials as being anti-parent. Sen. Gil DiNello, D-Clinton Template and the formation of the pro-

Sen. Gil DiNello, D.Clinton Township, called for scrapping the State Board of Education, selling the publishing rights to the Michigan Model, and passing bills protecting parental rights.

"The social engineers in the Michigan Department of Education are trying to make public schools surrogate parents," said DiNello, "and our kids are paying the prices for this ideological foray."

But the report and far-reaching recommendations are far from fi-nal, said Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, a member of the four-

man panel.
"I haven't had time to study it.
We agreed that it's not the final
report." said Geake, who is in the
final days of a congressional cam-

final days of a congressional cam-paign.

"It's supposed to be circulated to the membership. What I saw was a very rough draft merked 'preliminary, not for release.' Its somehow got out, so he (DiNello) released it so no one would say he was playing favorites," Geake said.

said.

The report was circulated to the Capitol press corps and marked "preliminary." It was also accompanied by a two-page news release from DiNello. A maverick who frequently supports Republicans, DiNello is the only Democrat who chairs a committee in the GOP-run Senate.

DiNello's panel held public hearings in Plymouth, Rochester

and seven other cities around the state. Other members are Doug Carl, a conservative Republican from Uties running for Congress, and Jim Berryman, a moderate Democrat from Adrian. Dilvation preliminary report and news release did not suggest the other three had signed or agreed.

The hearings were dominated by a handful of critics such as R. Kraft Bell of Northville and the DADS Foundation of Kalemazoo. Defenders of the Michigan Model say 95 percent of local districts have adopted it without controversy, calling critics a handful of right-wing religious scalots.

handful of right-wing religious zealots.

A Department of Education spokesman said a State Board committee is working on revisions to atisfy some of the critics.

But a DADS Foundation leader called the Michigan Model "so to inted and contaminated, it can't be modified."

Thrust of the Michigan Model,

according to the department spokesman, is to teach students how to make choices — to go buyond telling them to listen to their parents and church and help them understand why parents and church gave their advice.

DiNello advocates a law that mandates schools to teach "abstinence from pre-marital sexual activity." Critics want "moral absolutes" to be taught rather than "personal choice."

DiNello and the critics also want children to be taught that parents — not school personnel or pers — are the first, and chis, source of information on sex, alcohol, drugs, AIDS, birth control, pregmancy and other stressful situations.
