Corporate executives using a corporate visualizer could break down and then rebuild a manufacturing process with the help of their managers and workers.

Scientists could simulate and experience the Big Bang and Big Collapse theories.

Jacobson predicts that within the decade, many of these experiences will be common.

'Our ability to design information will determine how we as a society and as individuals come to know and understand the world we live in, Jacobson says.


Firms want to shop for electric power


