Retailers say road work taking big toll

Dan and Sandy McPheil want ou to know they're still in busi-

ness. The owners of Dan's Giant Submarines, more commonly known as Dan's Sub Shop, say they have lost two third of their business since the project to wid-en Orchard Lake Road tore up the roadway in front of their

business. County officials say with good weather, they could complete the project yet this year. But had weather could push completion into next spring, according to the project engineer.

"It's devastating to our business," restaurateur Dan McPhail said about the project, which has taken a good part of the past two years to construct. It was originally slated for completion in 1991.

Dan said his only option is to hold on. "You've got to stay upbeat about it," he said.
Dan's Sub Shop is on Orchard Lake just north of Grand River, and has lived for weeks with a one-lane access roadway north from Grand River because of the project, which was stalled for a while and started up again last week.

They have been at that location for 17 years, and have been in business in Farmington for 26

years.
Critical to the McPhails is
their sensonal holiday ham business, for which the season is juncstarting. Sandy McPhail said the
customer lunch count is so low,
that she and Dan know most of
the customers' first and last

mames.
"I'm just fearful it's not going to get done," Dan said. "This business is losing money now. We've been able to weather the storm so far."

The project has shut the resturant down several times, including when there was absolutely no street access to the shop, and other times when the

water was shut off. Other businesses along that stretch of Orchard Lake have also suffered, the McPhalis said.

Dave Reed, owner of the Farmington Bike Shop at Orchard Lake and Shlawassee which has been in his family since 1957, said his business also has been burt by the extended construction. But he was pleased to note that construction but he week, saying that's a "good sign."

The Orchard Lake Road widening project from 10 Mile to Grand River has taken much longer than anticipated to complete due mainly to contaminated soil found under the road. That caused time delays and involved of state and federal environmental officials.

Those delays prompted the cement contractor to move on to other projects. But last week, Farmington City Manager Robert Deadman said he was told the contractor would be back on the job and that the county would attempt to complete the construction work by Dec. 1.

Ozkland County Road Commission engineer Lisa Dackin said the county was hopeful, with good weather, that the project could be totally completed, including work on the east side of the road which has yet to be ton up.

The contractor can pour concrete into December, she added.
Worst case, she said, would mean paving the westerly two lanes of Orchard Lake, leaving gravel access driveways for businesses to the east, for the wintermonths, and completing the project in the spring.

Landscaping and sidewalk work along Orchard Lake is slated for completion in the spring.


