Hope Orchestra has high hopes for its 'Lingo'

The Hope Orchestra will celebrate the release of its first CD this week.

Time to break out the champagne bottles? Better break out the Business 101 books instead.

Expecting to be awash in glowing, multi-adjective discourses about the musical merits of "Lingo," their 12-song release, one is met only by the hum of industry from the alternative pop band.

Three of the five members are hunkered down at the kitchen table collectively folding invitations for this Saturday record release party at Alvin's. There seems to be a rather que sera sera attitude about the proceeding.

"It's a practical aspect of pop-music today," said lead guitarist George Schuster. "You have to have a recording of the band for your fans for them to listen to at their leisure."

Business acumen has seen Hope Orchestra through in their four years of performing including pre-Hope bands Of All Things and Walk the Dogma). Not surprisingly, the band's press kit trumpeting "Lingo" includes such useful office omenities as a letter opener and a card for the Rolodex with the hand's name on it.

Methodical, pragmatic — all those dasturdly things suppose to smother inspiration. Hope Or-chestra has this riddle figured out, though.

Somewhat lost in all this tends to be the CD itself, which features 11 original compositions with a cover of Jefferson Airplane's "Somebody to Love" for good

Musically, The Hope Orchestra Musicany, The Hope Orenestra has always been a tight outfil with Dave Lyon on drums and Pete Peltier on bass along with guitarists Schuster and Sosnick. Yet it's the classically stunning vocals of Jurgutis that offer an immediate focal point.

Lyrically, Hope Orchestra sways between '80s inspired polit-ical correctness and the sheepish-ly sentimental.

A number like "Politics of the Mind," which dates back to their Walk the Dogma days, is a crush-ing indictment of U.S. policy in Central America. "This Life You Call Money" lambastes yuppie greed.
