# Student sparks prosecutor's investigation

Oakland County Prosecutor
Richard Thompson has ordered
an investigation of the Oakland
University Board of Trustees aftrue a student accused the board of
illegally barring press and public
from committee meetings.

Thompson was asked by the
student, Oakland Post senior celltor Margaret O'Brien, to see if the
university board's policy is illegal
under the terms of the Michigan
Open Meetings Act.

Thompson said Tuesday that
he told the warrants division of
his office to interview O'Brien and
university officials (including
board members), then dedde if
the board has been breaking the
law.

Since 1970, when Oakland

Since 1970, when Oakland broke away from Michigan State University and get its own board of trustees, the press and public have been barred from OU committee meetings, said OU's general counsel John DeCarlo.

But DeCarlo doesn't believe the committees have violated the terms of the Open Meetings Act because there's never more than three trustees at a committee meeting.

However, O'Brien points to the Open Meetings Act's definition of "public body," which includes committees. The Act goes on to say that "all meetings of a public body shall be open to the public." Based on that, O'Brien believes the committee meetings should be open to press and public.
"It's really been an srea that hasn't been explored legally," she said.
O'U trustee Andrea Fischer, an

OU trustee Andrea Fischer, an attorney, doesn't believe O'Brien

is reading the Open Meetings Act correctly. "I think she reads it wrong." Fischer said. "No find decisions are made in those from dictions are made in those from sittle) meetings." Another Out trustee, L. Brooks Putterson (who was also just elected Oakland County executive), did not return the Eccentric's phone cail. Patterson spokeswoman Carmen Talbot said her boss would probably not want to talk about the situation.

O'Brien anid she'd like to dis-cuss the dispute with university officials, but "you can't have discussion when there's only one person talking. My next plan of action is to show up (at a commit-tee tneeting) and get thrown out."

O'Brien also wrote a letter to
Michigan Attorney General Frank
Kelley asking his office to investigate the board, too.
Attorney general spokesman
Chris DeWitt's comments were
guarded. O'Brien's complaints are
being looked into, he said, but "os
to how it will be resolved, it's too

early to say."

The OU board of trustees currently has three committees: finance and personnel, university affairs, and investment.
