

# Guard injured in fracas outside office building

A 19-year-old security guard was cut on the arm while attempting to apprehend a suspicious man outside the Tower 14 Office Building, Northwestern Highway at Civic Center Drive.

The victim told police he was in the south parking lot of the complex shortly before 2 a.m. when he spotted a man on the ground under a parked van. He got closer and saw the man get up and approach the van's door.

The guard yelled out and asked the suspect what he was doing and the man ran to the west side of the building.

"The guard caught up with him and grabbed him, apparently trying to apprehend him," Southfield police spokesman L.A. Moore said. "During the scuffle the man removed what looked like a large pocket knife from his

waistband and slashed the guard's left arm." The man was last seen running away.

The victim told police he recognized the man as someone he had seen begging for money on other occasions.

The victim was treated at the scene by Southfield paramedics.

Southfield police believe it was the same person who held up men making food deliveries Friday and Saturday to the Masonic Temple on Evergreen south of 11 Mile.

On Friday the intended victim tricked the robber and got away without giving up any food. On Saturday the victim gave up \$6 in cash and \$17.62 worth of food.

The first incident occurred shortly after 11 p.m. Friday when

a 41-year-old man was making a delivery to the Masonic Temple from a catering firm. The victim told police he was accosted from behind after he knocked at the building's rear door and got no response. The robber put his hand in his pocket, implying he had a gun, and demanded food.

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**CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE**  
NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE C-40-92, an ordinance to amend the Code of Ordinances, City of Farmington Hills, Michigan, by deleting language from the Traffic and Motor Vehicle Code, Chapter 30, Article IV, Section 30-683.

**THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDAINS.**

Section 1.  
Chapter 30, Article IV, of the City Code is hereby amended at Section 30-683, which shall now read as follows:

30-683. Noise.  
No person shall operate a motorcycle in the City in such a manner as to create excessive, unusual or unnecessary noise. Racing motorcycle engines or repeated acceleration and deceleration of motorcycle engines is hereby deemed to be excessive, unusual and unnecessary noise, or violent acceleration of a motorcycle, including acceleration which causes the front wheel of the motorcycle to lose contact with the ground, shall be deemed to create excessive, unusual or unnecessary noise.

Section 3. Severability.  
Section 4. Savings.  
Section 5. Effective Date: December 7, 1992  
Section 6. Enactment: November 16, 1992
