When the Birmingham Marian basketball team was assigned the same locker room as last year for Tuesday's regional championship game, senior Stephanie Storen felt

The Mustangs had lost to the same Farmington Hills Mercy opponent on the same floor at Southfield-Lathrup High in the same regional a year ago.

"But we were on the winning bench, and I figured the two would balance each other out," Storen said. We're not superstitious but we don't want to take any chances." Yeah, so much for those fears. Marian had nothing to worry about and everything its way as the Mustangs rolled over Mercy for a third time this year, 59-28.

"I couldn't concentrate all day during school," Storen said. "I was thinking about this game. We said we were going to change it this year. We knew we had the team end talent to beat Mercy and we proved it."

Marian (24-1) advances to the Class A quarterfinal game at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 2, at Berkley High School.

The Marlins (13-12), who reached the state final last year before losing to Detroit King, were winless against Central Division teams but had their eight-game winning streak anapped Threadow.

"We handled their pressure and got the ball across half court," Baker said, "but they took us out of our offense. They started doubling on Julie and then it was a real adventure to find the open girl."

Senior corter Tara Walsh scored a game-high 14 points and Judy Stunrt 11 for Marian. Jennifer Jalaba and MaryHelen Diegel contributed nine and eight off the bench, and Storen added six points to go with an all-around solid game.

Walsh, Storen, Diegel and Jalaba nhad six points each in the first half as Marain scored the first 10 of the second quarter for a 26-7 advantage and led 36-16 at halftime.
