As might be expected, the birdhouses vary in design and color, but all agree they make a unique gift that can be used outdoors or inside the home as an art piece. The prices range from \$30 to \$185, and proceeds are donated to the National Wildlife Federation.

If you're intrigued by the style that blends naturalism with sophistication, then look for handmade baskets by Winnie and Sam Yao at the Paint Creek Center for the Arts in downt Rochester. Should style trends interest you even more, then stop by the Chameleon Gal-leries in Plymouth for stunning examples of raku, an ancient ceramic firing technique that yields deep, iridescent colors. This technique has become popular lately, and you can understand why when you see Steven Oliziewski's work. His pieces are \$325. Denni Englehart, owner of Chameleon, has other smaller pieces for less.

When humor and irony are your main avenues of expression, the Mark Pierson painted wood sculptures at the Russell Klatt Gallery in Birmingham provide the right outlet. A visit to the Southwest also awakened the artist's inspiration — but in quite a different way from those who seak out time hor When humor and irony are your way from those who seek out time-honored legacies.


