Jan Ellis started the Bush Administration's parade home a bit early.

"I'll be working with Senate majority leader Dick Posthumus, assuring their activities reach the Michigan public. I'll be working with all the state senators," and Ellis, 36, who lived in Birming-min during the 1970s and '80s.

Ellis started Dec. 1 as deputy director of the state Senator, and williers of the state Senate Republican communications office, working for former Redfordite Andy Anuzis. The Lansing Job places her a short drive from her mother, Pegyz Ellis, now a Farmington resident.

"The people are very lucky have Dick Posthumus," she said, starting her work early. "He has a very good grasp of the economical climate, stays in touch with the community he's from (in rural Kent County) and still drives a plow on his farm."

Posthumus is a probable future candidate for higher office and is on most GOP short lists for the U.S. Senate in 1994.

"Glass celling" refers to women's perceived difficulties in rising to high executive posts in American corporations. Ellis said the torm had been in use for years before she came along, but takes credit for introducing it to the popular press.

"I came back to Michigan as field director of Brooks Patterson's campaign for governor," she said of the 1982 primary effort.

Interested singers are invited to see the first rehearsal. The fee for ioining the chorus is \$30. Call 370-3120.










